Dear Friends,

One day this week whilst I was out and about in the community visiting people, I met someone who eyed up my dog collar a little warily. In the middle of our chat the gentleman said "I'm a good person, I always try to be kind and helpful and I think that counts as being a Christian." Whilst I would agree that being good is commendable and something that Christians would indeed hope and aim to be, being a Christian is first and foremost about having a meaningful relationship with God: God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit. It's about believing in God, loving God and wanting to spend time with God talking, listening and getting to know God better. Then, this relationship with God goes on to influence how we relate to other people.

In the story of the road to Emmaus (the Gospel of Luke, chapter 24, verses 13 to 35) we hear how something about the relationship that Jesus had with his disciples and also how the disciples related to each other. The risen Lord Jesus accompanied the disciples, walking with them and listening to them when they were sad and grieving for Jesus their friend who had been put to death on the cross. We hear how Jesus tried to help them make sense of what had happened by teaching them. We then hear how they reached their destination at the end of the day and came to have a meal together. It was the way that Jesus blessed and shared the bread that allowed the disciples to truly recognise that Jesus was risen from the dead and was with them. These disciples then hurried the eight miles back to Jerusalem the same night to give the other disciples that good news. The disciples thought it was important for them to be with the other disciples to pass on the good news and share their excitement but they had also been reminded of how they had all gathered together when Jesus was alive. In short this example from the bible helps us see that being a Christian is also about, where possible, gathering with other Christians to worship God as well as being alone with God. Christianity is a religion of relationships: God the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit are in relationship, we are in relationship with God, with other people and the world. We cannot be Christians in splendid isolation.

On May 11th this year, we Christians celebrate the day of Pentecost: the day that the Holy Spirit came to the disciples. The Holy Spirit is God's power and it helps people to be more like God. It's impossible to always be loving, full of faith, of peace, joy and do what God wants without help from God and that's why God still gives us the Holy Spirit today. We also celebrate Pentecost as the birthday of the Church: the time when people gathered together to worship God and celebrate their relationship with God, to remember all that Jesus had done whilst he was on the earth and to tell other people about all this good news. Again, this is all about relationships with God and with other people.

In June we are fortunate enough to have two priests visiting the Tenbury Team from Tanzania; this offers us the chance to strengthen our relationships with the people we are linked with in Maramba. These priests will go with us as the clergy and laity gather together at the Hereford Diocesan Conference in Swanwick. This in turn is another opportunity for we in this diocese to gather together and strengthen our relationships with God and each other as we learn and worship God together.

But to develop our relationship with God we don't need to go as far as Swanwick: each weekday there is the opportunity to gather with others to worship God in St Mary's Church Tenbury. There are services throughout the team each Sunday. Over the next few months we will be celebrating the joining together of two people in a very special relationship in various services of marriage through out our team. And on some Sundays as we gather we will be welcoming new Christians into our Church as we celebrate the service of Baptism. There are also many activities going on during the week presenting the opportunity for fellowship- take a look through the magazine and you will find out about all the things on offer. We extend to you all a very warm welcome to anything that is going on.

Why not come along to something, meet us and strengthen your relationship with God?

Letter from the Bishop of Ludlow

"I am who I am" is the usual translation of God's name given to Moses at the burning bush. Jonathan Sacks says that the literal translation should be "I will be what I will be".

This is significant for us because it indicates God is the God of the future as well as the present and the past. We have been remembering in recent months how God sent Moses back into Egypt to bring the Hebrew nation out of slavery. It was an enormous task but the escape from Egypt gave them an identity and a calling as God's people.

Through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ we discover our identity as the Christian church and are called into the future by God to witness to his nature and loving purposes for all humankind.

At Pentecost we celebrate the outpouring of God's holy spirit on the first disciples and remember how they went out into all the world to follow the God who will be.

This has huge significance for us as we face up to the great issues facing us in the world today - the future of the world and its environment - feeding a rapidly increasing world population - sexuality - migration - local services such as schools, post offices and hospitals. There are no easy answers to any of these questions and they will not be found in a book. The message of the Bible and the message of Pentecost is that we believe in a God who calls himself "I will be what I will be" and his spirit leads us into the future to discover and discern his purposes.

Somebody might be tempted to ask what all these huge issues which face humankind are to do with the church. The answer is that we shall want to join in solidarity with all the rest of humankind of whatever faith, political creed or difference to face up to the future because we believe in the one God who is the source of all life and has created all men and women in his own image. Therefore we must treat one another with the same respect, dignity and love with which God himself deals with us.

That is why it is exciting to be a Christian in the 21st Century.

Fairtrade - April Family Service

Unfortunately the church's audio system was not used at the family service and many of the congregation were unable to hear the sketch on fair trade so we have put together some of the main points.

"Hi Dan", said his mum back from shopping with her friend Roz. As she unloaded her shopping she gave Daniel a bar of chocolate but was very surprised at the reaction!! "Mum how could you have bought this!!" said Daniel do you know where this came from? - it's very likely that this big producer used slave labour, young children like me being sold as slaves so that their families can live. Its awful!! You could have bought some Fairtrade chocolate that way we know that it is not made using slave labour!! Jenny was very surprised and wasn't quite sure what was happening!! Roz explained about the cocoa market - Cocoa prices are fixed by the International Markets and go up and down a lot, which makes it very difficult for small producers to constantly get a good price or plan their harvests. For instance, if a chocolate bar cost 90p they would get 2p. Everyone takes a cut, the people that make the product, the people that transport it and the people that sell it - which leaves very little for the people that sell the coco. Fair Trade buy their cocoa from co-operatives set up in Ghana - this is where a number of small producers get together and sell their beans to the fair trade chocolate producer, at a fair price and they also get a social premium. If there was not a co-operative the small supplier would have to sell at whatever price a producer would pay, they might cheat him or undervalue his goods. "What's a social premium Roz", asked Daniel's mum? It means they get an added amount of money per sack of cocoa beans. At the moment a sack of beans is £56 and they pay an extra £14 per sack this extra is used by the co-operative to pay for social projects such as schools, crèche facilities, sanitation, housing and lots of other projects that involve the communities. Fair Trade certification also guarantees that people work for fair wages, have the right to form unions, and that they work under health and safety standards and there is no child or forced labour.

Well done to Jenny & Daniel Wellings and Ros Plested who explained to us some of the principles of Fairtrade in the form of a drama. Also at the service was Caroline Thomas who set up her Traidcraft stall from which we could buy fairly traded things such as chocolate, sugar, tea, coffee, cereal, cards, and little gifts. Caroline will hopefully be able to come along again with her table of goodies but if anyone would like to purchase anything from her or would like to see the Traidcraft catalogue, please contact Caroline on 819642.
